



Rally Report: WBCCI 58th International, Farmington, New Mexico by Terry Rich

Those of us who represented the 4CU at an International Rally for the very first time feel as though we have earned our stripes by successfully surviving our first International event!


And represent, we did! First, three smaller caravan groups met prior to our final caravan into McGee Park, where the International Rally was held. We gathered in Gallup, NM, Durango, CO, and Albuquerque, NM on the morning of 25 June. Each group then made its way to a pre-arranged meeting point — the parking lot of the 1st Baptist Church Bloomfield, about 8 miles east of the rally grounds on the main drag between Bloomfield and Farmington. It was the perfect place to meet — a large, open paved lot with a great little Rotary International Gazebo and a Park in the corner with a grassy area and park benches; it was really nice, and the 4CU dogs loved it. And the church folks were very gracious. Our contact person at the church came out to say "hey" and we presented her with an envelope stuffed with a good-sized donation to the church as a "thank you" for letting us use their grounds. They didn't want to take it, but we insisted...it was the least we could do.

While the WBCCI Caravan & Parking Committees were aware we were coming and had a section reserved for us, we did have a bit of a bottle neck at the entrance. Just before we arrived several rigs pulled in ahead of us, none of which were pre-registered. This kinda threw the parking guys off their game. Despite the ensuing delay and frustration, eventually we were all successfully parked, all together in three rows. It was nice that we were not spread out in a single row...so we could gather and meet easier.

One of our group (making us 23 rigs) arrived a couple of days earlier than us and was allowed to park in our area, and we were joined Sunday by a brand new 4CU Member from CO: MJ Wylie (rig #24) — what a brave gal, making International her very first rally! And then an Affiliate Member, Doug Hart, from the New England Unit, led in a caravan of 3 of this NEU friends (that made us 28). Besides those parked with us we had another 17 rigs who were parked with the Vintage Airstream Club, various committees, officers, and on their own in other sections. All totaled, we reached Paul's "40 in Farmington Challenge". So yes, we did represent!





2014 Onyx Airstream 27FB

Our 2014 27FB Onyx is number 31 of the 136 made. With a move to South Dakota it was necessary for us to leave the Airstream in Prescott, where it is currently housed. We only have about 3,500 miles on it but are not planning more camper travel because of the move. This was our second Airstream, so we hate to put our camping on the shelf, but want someone else to enjoy our really fabulous Onyx.

We made a number of upgrades even though the Onyx is an Airstream on steroids. They include two 160W solar panels, an upgraded 2,000W inverter, roof mounted TV dish, awnings on the driver's side & the rear, & a weight distribution system that is a jewel. We have a number of other outfitting items that we'll leave on board.


We also have a mounted rear view camera on the Onyx. The monitor operates remotely by simply plugging it in to the 12V plug in the cab of a car or truck. Although many think it is a great back up camera (and it is), I think it is particularly good as a safety camera for on-road travel.

From the feedback we are receiving in South Dakota and Wyoming, there's a lot of interest in Airstream's ability to be a four-season camper. Our 27FB Onyx not only has the upgraded HVAC but the added 320W of solar power for added boon docking - or getting stranded in the winter. In case that happens, the added TV dish (auto channel seeking) means the occupants have something to do while the weather clears, with the added security of solar power. So the story is, Airstream as Airstream owners know is not season-limited and that is particularly so with Ricky, as we call our Onyx. Contacts we've received indicate that the notion of the Onyx as a collector's Airstream is just now being understood and the importance of only 136 models ever having been made (or possibly ever will be made) is of growing importance. Good time to upgrade to an Onyx or let friends know so they can join in the satisfaction, and fun, of an Airstream.



Sunset Crater Volcano &
Wupatki National Monuments
— and Bonito Campground


On one of our Airstreaming forays to Northern Arizona, we visited **Sunset Crater Volcano National Monument** and the nearby **Wupatki National Monument**. We had already stayed at one of our all-time favorite national forest campgrounds in the Flagstaff area, **Pinegrove Campground in the Coconino National Forest** (15 miles SE of Flagstaff off Lake Mary Road).

From Pinegrove, we moved to **Bonito Campground** just outside the entrance to Sunset Crater Volcano National Monument which is about 15 miles northeast of Flagstaff on Highway 89 toward Page, AZ. The campground is virtually across the road from the Visitor's Center for Sunset Crater, but outside the actual grounds of the Monument. That way one can stay in the campground without having to pay the fee to the Monument ... although it would be a mystery why anyone would <u>not</u> want to visit Sunset Crater since it's right there and very interesting. It's an awe-inspiring place and well worth the entrance fee ... with the added bonus of including entrance to Wupatki National Monument, which can be reached by driving north through Sunset Crater. And if you have a Senior Pass, it's free entrance to the Monuments and half price on camping.

Sunset Crater is a strangely interesting and other-worldly area. You feel like you are on another

planet that has exploded and just begun to cool off so that solid rock can be worn down into soil. Sunset Crater itself is a huge volcanic cone of loose cinders with trees struggling for a foothold in the steep ash slopes of the cone. That particular volcano came into being between 1040 and 1100 AD they say. It's only one of several cones in the immediate area ... most of which are a little older and therefore more eroded and less dramatic. Terry remembers that when he was in college in Flagstaff you could still hike to the upper reaches of the cone (climbing two steps up and sliding back one) and walk along the rim of the crater at the top. You can't do that anymore ... hikers are not allowed on the cone ... it's too fragile and vulnerable to damage from people climbing on it recklessly. Among the cones and hills of cinder ash are rivers of frozen lava flows. It's as though it flowed hot just yesterday and over night. The lava in the flows is still razor sharp and would do a number on any footwear made by mere man. There is vegetation in the flows and around the ancient volcanoes but you can tell it's a place

difficult to survive in. Trees are twisted and gnarled and there is very little grass or low vegetation ... just cinder ash. Yet, Mother Nature is persistent, and over time the vegetation will make in-roads. You can see that the older cones are already becoming hills and less defined mounds covered by trees.

We arrived at the campground in good time, as it's an easy, short drive. As we had projected, there were plenty of sites to choose from. We took a campsite on the far side from the visitor's center, right above an amphitheater where talks and presentations are given. The sites are paved and fairly level. Some of the sites, like the one we selected, are more pull-outs than pull-throughs ... with a line painted on the pavement delineating the road side edge of the site. In order to have sufficient space to put down our outdoor rug curbside, we were pretty close to that white line, so we did not use the street side awning while we were there ... didn't want to run the risk of it being taken off by a passing rig! The site sat at the top of a hill that sloped down to a lava flow that you can walk into for a close-up look at the unique formations in lava. The sloping hill from our campsite to the amphitheater looked like a black sand dune with trees sprouting up here and there ... but it was really volcanic

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cinder. We didn't let the Girls walk in it because it would tear up their footpads in no time. It would be like walking on crushed glass. We set up camp, then Terry took one of the propane tanks off the trailer and drove back toward town to a gas station/propane place we'd spotted on the way in to gas up the truck and fill the propane tank. All sites are dry camping. There are bathrooms but no showers, and you can get water, but only in portable jugs...filling your tanks via hose is not allowed. Also, there is no dump station at Bonita — presumably because of the geology of the area.

On Tuesday we toured the Sunset Crater Volcano National Monument and Wupatki National Monument. The two Monuments are linked by a road and each has an entrance from Highway 89. One fee gains access to both monuments and is good for several days. Of course we started with the Sunset Crater drive after stopping at the visitor's center. The road through the Monument winds though the craters and lava flows and has several pull-offs and vantage points to take it all in. There are some hiking paths designated but you are not allowed on the craters themselves ... and the "frozen" lava flows are naturally forbidding. The road takes you north and east from the volcanic area to lower elevations out of the pines and scrub oaks into a high desert terrain with panoramic views to the wide open spaces of the Colorado Plateau of Northern Arizona.



Before long you arrive at Wupatki, which is a very interesting and amazing Indian ruins out in the red sandstone stretches northeast of Flagstaff. Less than 800 years ago, Wupatki was the largest pueblo in the area but it's unclear why its people chose to live there, as it's one of the warmest and driest areas of the Colorado Plateau ... and it is still a mystery why those people left. One has to wonder if the Indians who lived at Wupatki saw volcanic activity in action since Wupatki was occupied relatively soon after the volcanos erupted.

As mentioned, there is an entrance from Highway 89 to Wupatki, so you can visit both Monuments from the two different directions depending on your travel plans. Of course, we were camped at Sunset Crater, so we drove to Wupatki, and then back on the same road ... it was interesting to see everything from both directions ... and it was equally beautiful from either. On the trip back to Sunset Crater one can see the San Francisco Peaks to the west, the 7,500+ foot mountain that rises just north of Flagstaff, and is the highest point in Arizona. (Terry hiked to the top of that, too, in his youth ... above the tree line and clouds to an alpine-like terrain. Ah, youth...)

This is a trip best taken in the summer camping season when the temps in the high country give you some relief from the desert heat (Bonito is open seasonally). Of course, though, it can get warm in these areas in the summer too, but it's all relative ... and as they say: It's a dry heat! Enjoy!
